Site Induction and Risk Management Plan

- This book is to remain at the garden site.
- Only persons who have been inducted to the site are permitted to work on the garden site.

Instructions

- 1. <u>All</u> volunteers must complete this site induction <u>before</u> they start work in the garden. This includes all casual participants and regular volunteers.
- 2. Follow the instructions in this guide to ensure that site hazards are identified and measures are taken to remove or reduce any risks.
- 3. A site induction record must be completed for every new participant at the garden site and repeated on an annual basis for all volunteers.

Conditions of participation

Discuss the conditions of participation as listed below.

Participants in garden activities must:

- Take reasonable care for his or her own health and safety, and make sure that their acts or omissions do not adversely affect the health and safety of other persons.
- Comply with any reasonable instruction that is given by the garden leader regarding work health and safety and to abide by the policies and procedures of the Alliance relating to health or safety.
- Have completed the site induction;
- Sign a daily work diary entry for each working occasion;
- Have read through the list of duties and have no medical condition that would limit their capacity to undertake duties;
- Be dressed appropriately for the works being undertaken (hat, gloves, covered shoes, sun-safe clothing);
- Use techniques that adhere to sustainable gardening principles, as discussed with the garden leader;
- Only undertake work that is consistent with the Agreed Action Plan for the garden site;
- Strive to ensure that the efforts and resources invested by the group will return a positive impact on the environment; and
- Strive to ensure that the garden group enhances community relations.

Standard garden volunteer duties

Discuss the duties volunteers will be undertaking and the physical requirements involved. Physical requirements may include the following, and can be modified to suit individual volunteer abilities.

- Moving and working on the garden site, involving:
 - Lifting and carrying equipment and materials;
 - Bending;
 - Planting and hand pulling of weeds;
 - o Standing; and
 - Walking.
- Use of hand tools
 - Hand dexterity
- Working amongst existing garden and on uneven ground
 - o Balance
 - Adequate eyesight

Risk Management Plan

Health and safety information

Discuss key aspects of health and safety at the site, noting any site specific issues.

Safe Work Procedures	Review the Risk Management Plan and Training information that relates to site's activities, including in relation to tools and equipment.	
Amenities	Advise inductee of the location of nearest toilets, hand washing, and other facilities.	
Tools and Equipment	Explain what tools and equipment are permitted to be used on the garden site and the safety measures to be taken when using them. Use of power tools is not permitted, with the exception of a hand held electric drill or small power saw.	
Personal Protective Equipment (PPE)	Explain the Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) requirements for the site, including sun protection.	
Emergency Procedures	Advise inductees of the procedures that need to be followed in the event of an emergency, actions they need to take and the location of assembly point.	
First Aid	Explain first aid facilities onsite and their location.	
Chemical use	Advise that synthetic chemicals are not to be used in the garden. All community gardens must be managed with environmentally sound practices, without the use of synthetic chemicals.	

Health and safety risks and controls

Exposure to sun, wind, and rain from working outdoors	 Avoid working in the hottest part of the day Wear hats and long sleeves, long pants Make use of available shade 	
(eg sunburn, dehydration, personal comfort)	 Take regular breaks Have sunscreen available and reapply as required Have adequate drinking water available 	
Bites and stings from wildlife and hazardous	Remain vigilant and aware of surroundings and alert others to potential dangers

Injury or damage related to extreme weather events	Cancel activities in case of extreme weather	
Injury related to incorrect manual handling	 Avoid lifting, moving or carrying heavy or awkward objects (eg use mechanical aids) 	
(eg lifting and moving soil, mulch and other materials; digging and bending over)	 Ensure two or more people lift heavy loads Explain and demonstrate proper lifting techniques Rotate tasks Check that equipment is appropriate for the tasks to be undertaken and properly maintained 	
Injury from slips, trips, and falls	 Ensure tools are safely stowed and do not create a trip hazard when not in use. 	
(eg uneven ground, wet surfaces, items or materials blocking walkways, equipment left behind)	 Maintain a neat and tidy working area Ensure volunteers and participants are wearing appropriate footwear Mark any temporary holes to make them visible 	
Contact with disposed material	 Do not handle any disposed material Report to garden leader Garden leader to report to Council on 4921 	
(eg illegal dumping)	O333 or land owner Avoid working in the area until the all clear has been given	
Injury from incorrect use of or faulty tools	 Explain and demonstrate correct tool use techniques Only use tools and equipment appropriate for use on garden site Use PPE as required 	
	 Always inspect tools before use and if signs of damage remove from use and report to garden leader Keep safe working distances from others 	
	 working around you while using tools Ensure tool is safely stowed and/or does not create a trip hazard when not in use.

Injury or damage from faulty construction	Obtain design and construction advice to ensure structure is sturdy and safe	
(eg garden beds or other garden structures)	Keep paths clear and level	
Injury from chemical	 Use of synthetic chemicals is prohibited 	
use (eg organic chilli-based sprays)	 Wear gloves and glasses when making, handling or applying chilli-based or other organic pest control Wash hands after making, handling or applying 	
Injury from contact with microorganisms (eg inhalation of dust or	organic pest controls. Ensure dust masks are available for volunteers

Injury from falling branches or vegetation	 Check for dead wood and branches that may fall Avoid areas in windy conditions Maintain an awareness of surroundings Wear eye protection 	
Managing Incidents Potential Emergencies and First Aid Kit	 Ensure emergency accessways are clear Ensure emergency procedures (eg meeting place and evacuation route) are in place and known by participants Register participants in Daily Work Diary participants upon arrival Carry appropriate first aid kit for number of people on site Check contents regularly and ensure adequately 	
	 stocked Ensure you or someone in your group has a charged mobile phone available. In the event of a serious incident, contact emergency services Working alone is not encouraged, but is allowed for small regular tasks such as watering, planting or tending a garden bed or compost. Tasks including heavy manual labour, moving 	
Health risks associated with food preparation and handling	 large amounts of materials, or construction may not be undertaken while working alone. Ensure adequate facilities are available for intended food preparation(eg heating / cooling) Adhere to standards set out by www.foodstandards.gov.au . 	
Risks to child safety and welfare	 Any children attending must be under the direct supervision of their parent or guardian (eg school teacher) at all times. Ensure volunteers complete a 'Working with Children Check' for child-related activities. 	
Injury and health risks associated with drug and alcohol use	Smoking, consumption of alcohol and illegal drugs are not allowed on the garden site.	
Injury associated with pets on the site	Pets and other domestic animals are not allowed on the site with the exception of registered Assistance Animals.

Unapproved activities carried out on site	Operate in accordance with Agreed Action Plan for garden site	

Environmental Hazards	Control Measures	Note any site specific issues
Identified historic and/or indigenous site conditions	 Explain any identified historic and/or indigenous site conditions that must be complied with, and refer to Agreed Action Plan 	
Planting Inappropriate species selection	Avoid introducing any noxious or environmental weeds to the site.	
Weeding Inappropriate identification of plants	 Leave plant if unsure Seek advice from garden leader or other Garden Member if required 	
Compost, mulch or soil runoff Pollution of water bodies	 Ensure mulch, compost or soil does not wash into waterways by placing away from water flow areas and allowing a buffer of vegetation adjacent to compost areas and garden beds. 	
Fire	 No smoking or discarding of smoking material on site Do not work on extreme fire danger days Identify the evacuation assembly area 	
Theft or damage to garden site and / or equipment	Ensure garden tools and other equipment are secured or taken off site when members are not present	
Excessive water use	 Educate volunteers about efficient watering practices If possible, utilise rainwater, eg install a water tank

Incident, Accident or Near Miss reporting

Discuss the procedure to follow in the case of an incident.

- 1. Ensure the wellbeing and safety of all participants as a priority.
- 2. Report the incident to other gardeners, and/or the garden leader immediately.
- 3. Review the required level of medical attention.
 - o **First aid only** (eg a band aid) Record the incident in the Garden Work Diary, and notify a garden leader who will forward a copy to the Alliance as normal for review.
 - Medical assistance Ensure that the person involved is safe from further injury, and seek medical assistance.

As soon as possible following the incident, the people involved are required to complete all the details on this form.
