



# **Dudley Sustainable Neighbourhood Community Attitudes Survey**

#### December 2010

A report on the attitudes of the Dudley community, prepared by Lake Macquarie City Council as part of the Sustainable Neighbourhoods program, February 2011.

#### **BACKGROUND**

Council's Sustainable Neighbourhoods program provides support to communities to plan and make changes that will reduce their ecological footprint at a neighbourhood scale.

In late 2010, Council and the Dudley community joined forces to support the growth of a Dudley Sustainable Neighbourhood Group and develop a Sustainable Neighbourhood Action Plan (SNAP) for Dudley. We have embarked on a range of activities to engage our neighbours, deepen our understanding of Dudley, and discover what Dudley residents are most passionate about.

This report presents the results of the Community Attitudes Survey, undertaken in Dudley in December 2010. The survey aims to gauge community attitudes to the natural environment, sustainable living, and climate change issues in order to inform the development of the Dudley SNAP.

The survey forms part of a program of community development and engagement activities to collect input from the broadest possible range of Dudley residents. Public workshops, information stalls, media articles, and hands on activities will also be used to gain input from residents. The survey captures some of the values, attitudes, and concerns of residents who may not participate in other engagement activities, and gives a broader perspective for the development of the SNAP for Dudley.

#### **METHODOLOGY**

In December 2010, the survey was posted to approximately 900 households in Dudley utilising Council's ratepayer database. The survey was a self-return format, with a prize draw promoted on the front cover as an incentive for residents to complete it. The survey form can be found in Appendix 1.

The survey asked respondents to:

- have lived in Lake Macquarie City for more than six months;
- be over 18 years old; and
- be one of the key decision makers in their household.

In total, 148 surveys were returned – a return rate of 16%.

#### **Key Findings**

#### 1. Local sustainability issues in Dudley

Respondents were most concerned about:

- Biodiversity (Protecting and enhancing bushland, habitat, wildlife, and natural environments)
- · Threat from bushfire
- · Water quality and stormwater management

The issues rated of most importance were:

- Having access to parks, beaches, bushland and other natural areas
- · Protecting and improving the natural environment
- · Reducing waste

#### 2. Climate change over the next 20 years

The majority (68%) of residents agreed that climate change will directly impact their life over the next 20 years, with the main impacts being:

- · Changes in weather / extreme weather events
- · Increased cost of living
- Increased temperatures / warmer weather

#### 3. Your sustainability choices

Most respondents (>70%) have one or more of these items on their property:

- · Water efficient appliances and fittings
- · Household insulation
- Energy efficient appliances

Native gardens (64%), vegetable gardens (54%), and composts (49%) are also relatively widespread.

#### Food scraps and organic waste

Over 70% of respondents dispose of their food / organic scraps in a compost, worm farm, or chooks. The most common reasons for not having a compost or worm farm include:

- My living circumstances are not appropriate
- · I need more information before I decide
- · I do not need or want a worm farm / compost

#### GreenPower

Almost one in five respondents purchased GreenPower, with comments indicating some confusion about what it is. The main reasons for not purchasing GreenPower are:

- · I cannot afford GreenPower
- · I do not know much about GreenPower

#### **Public transport**

Most respondents (over 78%) reported that they never or seldom use public transport. The most common reasons included:

- the route and timetables for public transport in my area is not convenient
- I prefer to use my car

#### Motivation

Respondents ranked 'A personal responsibility to do the right thing for the environment' as their primary motivation for improving their environmental behaviour, closely followed by, 'Rebates and incentives', and 'Saving money'.

#### 4. Sustainability actions in your neighbourhood

#### **Participation**

Respondents indicated they are most likely to participate in activities such as:

- · Growing native gardens
- Taking part in home audits (energy, waste, water usage)
- Education events specific to the region's flora, fauna and natural environment

#### The Sustainable Neighbourhoods Program

One third of respondents had either heard of (31%) or participated in (3%) the Sustainable Neighbourhoods program, with a flyer (included in the survey mail-out) being the primary means they had heard about it.

One hundred and nineteen respondents (80%) indicated that they would like to be kept informed about neighbourhood projects in Dudley.

#### 5. About Dudley

Respondents had a high level of agreement that:

- There are adequate natural environments in my neighbourhood for me to pursue leisure time activities
- I can call on a neighbour if I need help
- · Natural features in my neighbourhood should be protected and improved by residents
- In general, I feel that most people in my neighbourhood can be trusted
- I take measures to reduce my ecological footprint

The top three things people like about living in Dudley include:

- Proximity to natural environments (especially local bushland, coastline, and beaches)
- · It is peaceful and quiet
- People (friendly, trustworthy neighbours, community spirit)

#### 6. Your Ideas

Respondents contributed over 100 ideas and suggestions about how Dudley residents and/or businesses could improve the environment or community of Dudley. These were grouped into a number of categories including:

- · Fernleigh track, connecting cyclepaths, footpaths and pedestrian friendly
- · Protecting and enhancing natural areas and systems
- Environmental education and awareness raising
- · Community gatherings, meeting places and fostering social connection

- Reducing household energy use, water use, and consumption
- Public and community transport, and Ocean St maintenance
- · Reducing household waste
- Community wellbeing, safety, fostering pride of place and improving aesthetic
- Legislation and planning controls
- Other

## Implications for the Dudley Sustainable Neighbourhood Project

The results of this survey highlight some important points relevant to the development of a Sustainable Neighbourhood Action Plan for Dudley, and will be used to supplement similar information to be gathered from a range of other activities such as information displays and community workshops, and targeted community engagement activities.

#### Values and Assets

The suburb is set in a beautiful natural setting, surrounded in three directions by high quality bushland (Glenrock and Awabakal Nature Reserves), beaches, and a spectacular coastline. The proximity to these natural assets and the community's clear appreciation for them highlight the potential for community involvement in managing and protecting these natural assets.

Dudley is in a distinct location (there is no through traffic), and has a small, village or hamlet atmosphere, enabling residents to experience peace and quiet, while being relatively close to major town centres at Charlestown and Newcastle.

Dudley residents have identified they live in a safe, friendly, and tight-knit community. This connectedness amongst residents and feeling of community pride is a significant asset to integrate into the development of a more sustainable and resilient neighbourhood.

#### **Issues**

Respondents identified a very broad range of issues in their neighbourhood, with a high proportion of responses relating to the protection of the natural environment. In addition, the threat of bushfire appeared as a significant issue for many residents, as well as waste management, transport (public transport and cycling), reducing water and energy use, and public infrastructure, urban development and government services.

Identification of these issues from a broad cross section of the Dudley community is essential as a basis for developing sustainability actions that will address those actions of highest priority for the majority of Dudley residents.

#### **Actions**


The survey results highlight some potential neighbourhood actions and give an indication of activities that are likely to gain popular support from the Dudley community. Actions that address the issues mentioned above are likely to have community support. Other popular suggestions included:

- Community support to connect the existing Fernleigh Track route to Dudley and otherwise encourage improved public transport, cycleways and pedestrian friendly infrastructure;
- · Establish a community garden;
- A variety of projects to protect and enhance Glenrock and Awabakal reserves and adjoining bushland, coastline, and beaches;
- Actions to prepare residents for bushfire emergency;
- Information and hands on workshops, educational field trips, and home audits of backyard, energy, waste and water use; and
- Community social events and gatherings such as picnics and performances.




- I like Dudley the way it is

#### Q1b. Please rate how important you think the following are to your neighbourhood




#### 2. CLIMATE CHANGE OVER THE NEXT 20 YEARS


Q2a. How strongly do you agree, or disagree, that climate change will have a direct impact on your life over the next 20 years?

## Q2b. If you agree or strongly agree with the statement in Q2a, what do you think will be the MAIN impact of climate change in the next 20 years?




#### Other responses included:


- Our habits and their impact on the earth


#### Q3a. Do you have any of the following items on your property?




#### Q3b. If you do not compost food scraps, please indicate why. List all reasons that apply.




Q3c. If you do not have a working worm farm, please indicate why. List all reasons that apply.

Q3e. If you do not use GreenPower, please indicate why. List all reasons that apply.




#### Other reasons and extra explanations included:


- Solar panels are still too expensive and inefficient.




#### Other reasons and extra explanations included:





#### 6. YOUR IDEAS

Q6. Do you have any suggestions about how you, the people in your neighbourhood and/or business could improve the environment or community of your neighbourhood? Responses have been categorised into six major categories.

#### Fernleigh track, connecting cyclepaths, footpaths, pedestrian friendly

- Link old rail corridor (behind hotels via Foxdale Avenue) to Fernleigh Track
- Bicycle walking link to Fernleigh Track, Improving local service businesses and community health and connection by meeting on the link and Fernleigh Track
- Use of former Dudley rail line as a connection to the Fernleigh Track
- · More cycle ways leading to Charlestown and Whitebridge to keep off roads
- Continue Fernleigh Track to Dudley
- Develop access to Fernleigh Track from Dudley, Develop coastal walk from Dudley Bluff to Redhead (it is possible to walk this already but a lot could be done to improve access to the track and signage)
- Better access to Fernleigh Track from Ocean Street
- Build the Dudley Spur to the Fernleigh Track which follows the old railway line and finishes at the pub. What an asset to the village this would be and would make access to the track safer
- Cycleway connection to Fernleigh Track (partly privately funded by residents, good for environment/local residents/business)
- Strong need to have a cycle link to Fernleigh track so that children in Dudley can get there safely - probably the most inaccessible of all suburbs east of the old Highway

- Upgrade link from Dudley to join existing Fernleigh Track, At present many including kids have to ride along the main road to get to Whitebridge
- Connect to the Fernleigh Track as a community project including Dudley School
- Improve relationship between cyclists/motorists
- Footpaths
- Footpaths so you can walk with a pram in safety off the road
- Footpath between Thomas and Railway Street North Side of Dudley Road what a mess
- Improve footpaths often non-existent, even as bus stops, often sloping/uneven ground
- Continuing the cycleway to the sports ovals via the old railway cutting.
- Better quality walking tracks Fernleigh Track is great but there are lots of short tracks that could be built or improved
- Roads take up approximately 30% of our area. Better use through traffic calming devices, cul-de-sac for children's play area through 5km/hr speed limit as practiced in Canada

#### Protecting and enhancing natural areas and systems

- Greater controls over water runoff and weeds in edges of reserves active management by community in partnership with NPWS and LMCC.
- When I walk down bush track to Dudley Beach rock platform and remove all new bitou bush growth and have done so for many years
- Weeding and clearing of the Dudley Spur line corridor
- We could form a Landcare group for the Awabakal Reserve and surrounding areas after council has eradicated weed infestation in the surrounds
- More street trees
- Nature strip vegetation where appropriate residents with help from LMCC
- · Street tree planting by members association with wires underground
- Nature strip planting of suitable native shrubs
- Don't throw garden waste and grass clippings in bush reserves
- Stop putting grass clippings in our waterways and reserve areas. Absolute joke by residents I am victimised for objecting
- Traps for Myna Birds (a bounty)

- Environmental works such as constructed wetlands to treat water flowing from Eden Close to Dudley Beach and at the head of creeks draining into South Dudley Beach
- Clean gutters, no storm water can run away
- · Curb and guttering roads to assist with silt and storm water
- · Greater use of storm water capture
- · Keep their property tidy, Regular mowing
- Community environmental work e.g. planting with associated picnic

- A little more education of residents to what walking trails exist apart from Fernleigh - Awabakal, goat track, Bombala etc, This will make those that don't go there appreciate the area even more

- Increased knowledge of the environment (promote through schools)

#### Community gatherings, meeting places, and fostering social connection

- To have fetes or fairs (local school)
- Have performances or music/art through local sites

- · Local fairs, markets, surf festivals
- Council could help organise street markets as an annual celebration
- Get together regular meetings and activities (builds trust and focus and action)
- A playgroup based in Dudley
- More off leash dog parks
- Play equipment for children
- More parks and children's playgrounds, skate parks etc to keep children occupied and out of trouble

- Weather shelters in parks near Pensioners Hall, BBQ, meeting place
- Dudley Day/night fair once a year
- Community markets
- Neighbourhood watch (or similar) to reduce antisocial behaviour such as hooning drivers, graffiti and litter.
- A good skateboard park, could be near the Dudley Spur line behind Ocean View Hotel or near League or Soccer Oval
- More community events, participate in more of these
- better space for gathering around local shopping centres
- Skateboard park near the community hall
- Have a local 4 monthly meeting to discuss issues in our area and ways to fix the problems. Then pass it onto the Council

#### Reducing household energy use, water use, and consumption

- Information on keeping chickens
- Affordable solar and water tanks for working families
- Bulk buying of solar panels and rain water tanks
- · Greater use of solar electricity

- Community swap meet
- I think pools in private homes should be banned as a way of saving water whether they can afford it or not. It is a waste of a valuable resource as we are fortunate to have the sea, Lake and council pools.
- Group take up of solar and natural gas utilities.

#### Public and community transport, and Ocean St maintenance

- Better public transport, Light rail all around Newcastle, smaller buses like they
  use in the UK
- Community car pool system(s)
- Walking school bus(es)
- Better public transport, less use of cars
- Fix Ocean Street this is dangerous and is a disgrace amongst all residents

- For a start, we would so like a safe road, the upkeep is second to none from the shopping centre to the end of Ocean Street, it is appalling, an accident waiting to happen at the Junction of Bombala and Ocean Street
- We need to do something about the very very unsafe Ocean Rd in Dudley
- Have regular meetings, get togethers to protest about how terrible Ocean Street road is

#### **Reducing waste**

- Community composting/worm farming (maybe an alternative to a third green waste bin),
- Recyclables to local schools and preschools for use (art and craft paper, containers etc)
- Have state-wide returnable deposit on glass bottles, Plastic containers
- Local dump point (e.g. Dudley end of Oakdale Rd) for domestic use only of electrical, oil, batteries, gas cylinders, paint, larger tree off cuts and some building products) that your collections do not collect each year
- As a community we could campaign Lake Macquarie Council for green waste bins and smaller waste (general) bins

- Creating a better waste system for individual houses. We have 5 people in one house and 2 are babies (Lots of rubbish and not enough bins)
- Third waste bin should be optional not compulsory
- Bar code garbage bins so user pays on rates, I live alone and don't need to put bins out as often but pay the same as others
- Clean up rubbish in streets when see it not just on one day per year
- Reduce packaging or make packaging biodegradab

#### Community wellbeing, safety, fostering pride of place, and improving aesthetic

- When I retire from work I intend to use the extra time to be involved in community building activities
- Integrating environment/community groups with the P&C and school
- Not really. I consider myself to be a good neighbour, not a nosey one
- Stop putting themselves first
- Remove one liquor license from Dudley
- Very dark at night, needs lights
- Focus on and support local businesses
- Police/rangers need to stop nude sunbathers at northern end of Dudley Beach
- Do something about the mosquitoes
- Take down the 8 foot fence around the oval roundabout at the top of the hill

- Speed bumps on Ocean Street
- Hotels to take more responsibilities for smashed glass on footpaths
- Remove sports grounds fencing this is a direct contradiction to sustainable neighbourhood!!
- Remove monument and put down near School of Arts Hall, and put roundabout at Dudley and Redhead road intersection
- A statuesque town tree to be planted in the roundabout at Whitebridge gives pride to our environment
- Become more community proud of the great little place we live in
- look at putting in another shop where bottle shop was
- Improve the small shopping centre area around Glass/Dudley Stop & Go with some street planting, bollards or maybe some public art
- Fix up the dilapidated shop opposite Dudley Public School on Ocean Street

- Be open minded about new dwellings and heritage





- Increase library resources maybe centralise Redhead library to Charlestown and provide a mobile weekly service




#### Q7a. Please indicate your age bracket







#### Q7b. Thinking about the home you live in, do you:






#### Q7c. How many people currently reside in your home?
