Redhead Resident Nominated for Gardener of the Year

Redhead's John Le Messurier says a scouting badge he earned as a child was all the inspiration he needed to dedicate over 40 years to an ambitious project – establishing a native garden at the once-barren Glenrock Scout Camp.

John, 78, is in the running to become *Gardening Australia*'s Gardener of the Year. He was selected as the NSW finalist of the television program's competition in recognition of the sanctuary he has created at Glenrock.

"Having gained the environment badge as a scout, and the gardener badge as a cub, I was motivated to do it," he said.

"But the result just spurs me on.

"It's a difficult site because it was an old mine site and had thick heavy clay, no top soil."

Years of voluntary labour, performed in his spare time, have blossomed into half-a-hectare of native garden and a swathe of regenerated bushland.

John has planted 26 individual garden plots on the campsite, all created with the intention of "producing nice colours, flowers and fruits".

He said his favourite was the "wild garden".

"That's a garden that has native raspberry plants. I also planted spiky native vines, a lot of rainforest plants and other tall trees and shrubs.

"The reason I like it is the fact that it protects the little birds. And the little birds that live in there all sing.

"When you get near the garden you hear a chorus of music."

He said he also loved the gardens for the memories of those of who have contributed to its growth over decades.

John's three daughters encouraged him to enter the *Gardening*Australia competition. But he is not looking for recognition, he said.

"I should be paying somebody for doing this work, because I am enjoying it," he said. "It's great for the body, the soul, and great for the environment."

Ray Keys Remembered

Ray Keys died on 13 November 2018, he was farewelled at Newcastle Cathedral. Ray lived at High Street Redhead for around 44 years. Many Redhead residents think that the Christmas season hasn't commenced until the lights go up on the Redhead Christmas tree.

Since 1978 Ray Keys helped to put up the lights and made possible the High Street Christmas Eve parade. Many generations of children from Redhead and neighbouring areas have great memories of those parades. From what started as Santa simply walking up the street to distribute presents the High Street Christmas parade grew with Santa arriving in so many varied modes of transport. For 36 years Ray supplied, engineered and transformed them all.

Too many to list, they included: Horses large and small, a mini moke sleigh pulled by a reindeer, an E type Jag, a VW beetle car transformed to a Fred Flinstonemobile, and a T-model Ford serving as the cage for the animals from Madagascar. A quad bike became a base for a Sailing Ship, a large trailer served as Shrek's Onion Coach, and the VW beetle was specially spray painted as the Wiggles vehicle (below).



Ray was instrumental in not only providing the vehicles, but also in helping to engineer in his garage the many ways the vehicles could be decorated and safely used.

Ray did this in his usual quiet and unassuming manner and welcomed many into his home and front yard for High Street Santa's present giving. Ray will be sorely missed by many but especially by his neighbours in High Street and by the many Redhead children over the years who enjoyed his skills and generosity. Redhead has lost a good one.

It makes us think that we can all celebrate the strength of our neighbourhood and community at this time of the year, if we put a bit of effort in.... just like Ray did, with a smile, with kindness and for no reward.


